## REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR

---

I open this introductory report on 13 February, the anniversary of the National Apology, and reflect back on 2008. A good place to start is where I ended a year ago, commenting on the change of Federal Government and the emergence of 'evidence-based research' as a key term in policy discourse. The other key term that is arguably the core of the Rudd government's Indigenous affairs policy framework is 'Closing the Gap', a term that was given high profile as the practical and future-oriented element of the National Apology and that was quickly adopted by the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) as the basis for integrating Commonwealth, State and Territory joint-action to address Indigenous disadvantage. I should note that this term was first used in Australia in 2007 in relation to a community-focused health campaign 'Close the Gap' mounted by a coalition of influential non government organisations (NGOs) and supported by Kevin Rudd back then. It is sometimes confused with the COAG platform that is focused on six areas to close the gaps, one of which is eliminating the life expectancy gap between Indigenous and other Australians in a generation.

The last year in Indigenous affairs has been far more stable than 2007, although that year was unusual with both the Northern Territory Emergency Response (NTER) and a hotly contested federal election. This has allowed two major initiatives at the Centre for Aboriginal Economic Policy Research (CAEPR) established in late 2007 to bed down.

The first is the Indigenous Population Project sponsored by the Ministerial Council on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs (MCATSIA) (see <<http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/population.php>>). This project, led by Dr John Taylor, is focused on reporting Indigenous demographic, social and economic trends; it has been extraordinarily productive during its first full year and provides an important point of collaboration and strategic contact with policy makers in Commonwealth, State and Territory agencies. This three-year project is already nearing its half-way point and discussions are now underway to ensure its timely extension so as to be able to retain the excellent team that has been recruited. The productivity of the Indigenous Population Project was such that it was beyond CAEPR's capacity to publish outputs in a timely manner, and so MCATSIA assisted with funding for an additional part-time position. We were very pleased to recruit Gillian Cosgrove—who had previously worked at CAEPR in 1995—to this post.

The second is the People on Country Project (see <<http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/country/index.php>>) that has the full title 'People on Country, Healthy Landscapes and Indigenous Economic Futures'. I lead this unusual applied research project team, funded by the Sidney Myer Fund, in collaborating with a number of community-based Caring for Country endeavours in the Top End of Australia to explore ways to enhance productive natural resource management activities. During 2008 we were fortunate to recruit Dr Emelie Ens, an ecologist, to the team. Much of our work in 2008 focused on making links with project partners, assisting them with both practical research

and facilitating conduits to additional project support. Considerable effort was also expended in developing a media-rich website and in making numerous submissions about the role played by Indigenous people to government inquiries about natural resource management issues. This project too is seeing emerging links being forged with the Federal Department of Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts. We have produced a stand-alone annual report for this project available at <[http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/country/doc/POC\\_AR\\_2008.pdf](http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/country/doc/POC_AR_2008.pdf)>.

As these two new projects gained traction, the Indigenous Community Governance Project (ICGP), which began in 2002, came to an end. This project was initially an ARC Linkage project between CAEPR and Reconciliation Australia, but it grew with additional support from the Federal, Western Australian and Northern Territory Governments to eventually focus on 12 sites throughout Australia. A major publication, *Contested Governance: Culture, Power and Institutions in Indigenous Australia*, edited by Janet Hunt, Diane Smith, Stephanie Garling and Will Sanders and published by ANU E Press was launched in October by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner, Tom Calma. While this monograph is the major scholarly outcome from the project, there are numerous other outputs available on the project site <[http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/ICGP\\_home.php](http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/ICGP_home.php)>. During 2008 this project was mainly supported by Reconciliation Australia and CAEPR and while it was our joint view that there was still considerable research to be undertaken in this area, our work on community governance will be greatly reduced in 2009 owing to an unfortunate absence of sponsorship.

An outstanding feature of 2008 has been the level of input provided by CAEPR staff to parliamentary and bureaucratic inquiries. This level of activity can partially be explained by the election of a new government and its interest in generating an evidence-base for policy review and development. In my more than 30 years experience in Indigenous policy research there have been other changes of government, but never before this level of review activity. Of particular significance was the appointment of John Taylor as an expert adviser to the independent review of the NTER from June to October, and the provision of submissions to this important review by a number of CAEPR staff. CAEPR was also pleased to have three staff— Janet Hunt, Frances Morphy and myself—participate in the 2020 Summit in April 2008. All told, 24 submissions were made by CAEPR staff during the year to a vast array of inquiries, as outlined in Appendices D and F.

Given CAEPR's core goal to make our research available to national and international publics, it is extremely pleasing that the growth in accessing and downloading CAEPR's outputs has continued to increase in 2008. Total website traffic was 577.29 gibibytes (GiB), an increase of 36 per cent since 2007. The CAEPR site recorded over 2,600,000 hits over the twelve month period (see Fig. 1). Similarly, we have found that downloads of our monographs distributed by the ANU E Press have continued to grow [see Table 2]. We look forward very much to a broad readership engaging with our latest monograph on Indigenous governance that will, I am sure, have significant influence. If this growth was precipitated by the NTER in 2007, it seems safe to assume that the expanding interest in 2008 may reflect a growing interest in evidence-based research based on active collaboration with Indigenous communities and organisations. Partly in response to this, CAEPR undertook a special project to continue to

update and modify its web-presence, and recruited Tsvetana Trifonova, a web designer, to totally revamp our site. This project is due for completion by mid 2009 and will result in a more accessible and interactive site.

In 2008, CAEPR expanded its graduate teaching activities especially in the Masters in Applied Anthropology and Participatory Development (MAAPD). The Indigenous Policy speciality in this fee-paying Masters now has a course in 1st semester on Indigenous Policy and in 2nd semester on Indigenous development. The growth in these offerings has also seen an increase of student numbers in 2008. Over the 2008–09 summer period we were also pleased to host two Summer Scholars, Erina Okeroa (with the Fenner School of Environment and Society (FSSES)) who joined the People on Country Project and looked at the transferability of the Indigenous Protected Areas Program to Aotearoa/New Zealand; and Michael Jones who has been undertaking research assessing public policy theories using Commonwealth Indigenous affairs as a case study. For the first time, we hosted an Aurora Program intern, Kate Webb. Our PhD cohort remained small in 2008, but in 2009 we have already recruited two new students and have three more scholarships available that we anticipate filling early in 2009. Visiting Indigenous Fellows Daniel Oades and Mark Shadforth from the Kimberley Land Council visited CAEPR in August to collaborate on the final report on the value of Indigenous harvest and management of dugong and marine turtles prepared for the North Australia Indigenous Land and Sea Management Alliance (NAISMA) Dugong and Marine Turtle Project; and Robin Smythe visited CAEPR in April to work on his autobiography in collaboration with Post-Doctoral Fellow Inge Kral.

In 2008 we have had celebrations, goings and comings. Two staff at CAEPR, Janet Hunt and Seán Kerins, submitted their PhD theses at RMIT University and Griffith University respectively that were subsequently conferred. In October, Janet Hunt was awarded a Sir Ronald Wilson Human Rights Award by the Australian Council for International Development. Four staff left, Stephanie Garling to Scotland, Virginie Branchut to work in Maningrida, Sarah Holcombe to employment as a research fellow at the National Centre for Indigenous Studies in the College of Law at ANU, and Karen Montefiore on maternity leave. At the end of 2008, Julie Lahn took two years leave without pay from her post-doctoral position at CAEPR. Also at the end of 2008, Maria Davern, who has been our very capable executive officer and business manager, signalled that she will be moving to a more senior position at the Research School of Social Sciences (RSSS) at ANU. Fortunately we were able to recruit a new cadre of very talented staff to replace them including Hannah Bulloch, Katherine May, Denise Steele and Kirrily Jordan.

2009 will be CAEPR's twentieth year since establishment in 1990. In my view this will be an enormously challenging year for Indigenous policy-making and research. In 2008, the Rudd Government and COAG jointly committed to close the gap on a range of indicators where Indigenous socioeconomic disadvantage is clearly very apparent. This ambitious and admirable commitment was made before the global financial crisis of late 2008 and the subsequent impact on the world and domestic economies. It will clearly be an enormous challenge to ensure that in 2009 gaps

in a number of the areas that we focus our research on—like Indigenous employment and educational status and access to housing—decline in accord with COAG aims rather than grow. As our Research Plan 2009–2011 (available at <http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/>) indicates, we will be undertaking considerable research in collaboration with our numerous research partners that will once again inform a range of interest groups in Australian society, and the general public about the problems, prospects and challenges for Indigenous development broadly defined.

I would like to end by sincerely thanking the team at CAEPR for their considerable efforts in 2008 working in an area that can be difficult and even fraught at times. In my view, the way that we work together means that the whole of CAEPR is far better than any specific part, and our multi-disciplinary collaborations add value to our outputs in a very complex area of public policy research. Some at CAEPR experience more career uncertainty than is justified, especially given that much of our core team has been at the Centre for well over a decade. But despite this, both old-timers and new academics, research support and administrative staff, collaborate extraordinarily effectively to ensure year-in, year-out performance of which, I believe, we can all be justifiably proud.

## INTRODUCTION

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**C**AEPR is a multidisciplinary social sciences research centre established in 1990 at ANU. It is a unique national and international research centre, a leading research think-tank on Indigenous policy issues and operates in a complex political arena. Since 1990 it has established an unrivalled reputation and track record in a public policy area of national significance. The CAEPR Strategic Plan 2006–2008 is available from the CAEPR website at <[http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/strategic\\_planning/strategicplan2006.pdf](http://www.anu.edu.au/caepr/strategic_planning/strategicplan2006.pdf)>.

We undertake high quality evidence-based multi-disciplinary research on Indigenous economic and social development and associated issues, and maintain an independent role in Indigenous public policy research. We invest considerable effort in making our research findings accessible to Indigenous organisations, universities, research institutions, Australian governments, industry and the wider community. CAEPR's research and education goals correlate closely with those of ANU, as set out in *ANU by 2010*. CAEPR is part of the ANU's College of Arts and Social Sciences (CASS), one of the seven ANU Colleges that link research and teaching at undergraduate, postgraduate and higher degree levels. CAEPR offers the opportunity for full-time or part-time students to undertake research leading to a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) or Master of Philosophy (MPhil) degree in a broad range of disciplines including anthropology, demography, economics, political science, and public policy. CAEPR staff teach the elective 'Development Dilemmas for Indigenous Australians' in the Master of Applied Anthropology and Participatory Development (MAAPD), and offer student internships to participants in that program.

Much of CAEPR's research is underwritten by ARC Discovery and Linkage projects, and partnerships with MCATSIA and the Sidney Myer Foundation. Our research priorities also reflect those of valued industry partners such as the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), Reconciliation Australia (RA) and Fred Hollows Foundation. We retain a funding relationship with the Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA). We have further partnerships with Desert Knowledge Cooperative Research Centre (DKCRC), Tropical Rivers and Coastal Knowledge (TRaCK) hub, NAILSMA, Oxfam and the First Nations Foundation.

## MANAGEMENT AND STRUCTURE

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**C**AEPR operates under a Director who is assisted by an Advisory Committee. Professor Jon Altman, Foundation Director since 1990, is responsible to the Vice-Chancellor for the overall operation of the Centre and also reports to the Chair of the Advisory Committee. Members are appointed by the Vice-Chancellor, Indigenous community representatives are appointed by the Advisory committee, and one member is still appointed by the Secretary of FaHCSIA. The CAEPR Advisory Committee membership for 2008 appears below. The Advisory Committee met in September. ## EQUAL OPPORTUNITY

## INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT

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Indigenous engagement is a high priority within CAEPR, reflected in the third key strategy of the *CAEPR Strategic Plan 2009–2011*. Our commitment to active engagement with Indigenous individuals, communities and organisations across a range of areas is focused on:

- Fostering and developing engagement with key Indigenous individuals, organisations and communities and policy makers in all aspects of the research, teaching and policy environment
- Broadening Indigenous engagement with CAEPR's research
- Disseminating research findings to Indigenous people.

Our Visiting Indigenous Fellowships program provides resources for scholars to collaborate with CAEPR researchers. Developed with significant financial contributions from the Rio Tinto Aboriginal Foundation and the Westpac Foundation in partnership with ANU, the program provides opportunities for Indigenous research capacity building, and facilitates collaboration between CAEPR research staff and non-CAEPR Indigenous researchers and leaders. This year fellowships were awarded to Robin Smythe, Daniel Oades, and Mark Shadforth (see Visiting Indigenous Fellow section).

CAEPR's Indigenous Engagement Strategy is in line with the ANU Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). An ANU RAP Committee comprises Indigenous and non-Indigenous academics and general staff from across the campus as well as Indigenous students and community members with relevant expertise. It has identified areas of activity where the University could enhance its Indigenous involvement by establishing initiatives with clear actions, deadlines and measurable targets. Jon Altman, Maria Davern and separately Boyd Hunter have provided input and assistance to this process. After a period of extensive consultation and drafting, the document is due to be launched in early 2009.

## RESEARCH PROGRAM

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**T**he CAEPR Research Plan 2008–2010 is built around four themes:

- Economic, cultural and social circumstances
- Economic development aspirations and sustainable futures
- Governance, policy and the state
- Education and learning for life.

The CAEPR research projects are described below. The output of each project during 2008 is identified after each project description. ### THEME 1: ECONOMIC, CULTURAL AND SOCIAL CIRCUMSTANCES

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#### Comprehensive 2006 census regional analysis

This project comprises part of the wide-ranging research for MCATSIA on Indigenous demographic, social and economic trends over three years, managed by Dr John Taylor. This has involved a number of government, industry and Indigenous stakeholders including FaHCSIA, the Kimberley Development Commission, the WA Department of Housing and Works, Woodside Energy, the Kimberley Land Council, Lingiari Foundation, the Yawoorroong Miriuwung Gajerrong Yirrgab Noong Dawang Aboriginal Corporation (MG Corporation), and the Marinwarntikura Women's Resource Centre at Fitzroy Crossing. Other work on regional profiling was provided to the Review of the Northern Territory Emergency Response, as residual research on the Wadeye region, and as residual output from earlier work for the Desert Knowledge CRC.

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## Indigenous Australians and alcohol control

This year fieldwork was conducted in the Barossa and Riverland regions of South Australia focusing on community-ownership of public hotels, and in Alice Springs focusing on the Aboriginal-owned Tyeweretye Club. Interviews were conducted with licensees in Bourke, New South Wales. Dr Boyd Hunter chaired a panel session 'Indigenous Development and Governance' at the *Economics and Democracy Conference*, which questioned whether commercial objectives are effectively separable from social goals for either public or private enterprises—a crucial question for this ARC project.

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## Analysis of the dynamics of Aboriginal interactions with the criminal justice system

This ARC project runs until 2010 and aims to further analyse data from the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Survey and New South Wales local court data. Ms Kate Sullivan commenced doctoral research on the qualitative aspects of this project in March 2008, applying an ethnographic approach to an analysis of re-offence and desistance from crime. Statistical analysis is being conducted by Dr Boyd Hunter and Ms Aarthi Ayyar to gain some insight into the dynamics of Aboriginal interactions with the criminal justice system.

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### After the National Emergency

The implications of the Northern Territory Emergency Response were analysed in collaboration with the Central Land Council (CLC). 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### Indigenous poverty alleviation and natural resource management

This applied research project, supported by the Sidney Myer Fund, links Indigenous poverty alleviation and natural resource management to new resource-based development opportunities in six Indigenous communities in the Top End of the Northern Territory and with one traditional owner group in the West Kimberley of Western Australia. Extensive fieldwork was undertaken in north-east and central Arnhem Land, focusing on Indigenous Protected Areas and Caring for Country projects. 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## Measuring changes in social and economic wellbeing

This collaborative research project was undertaken with the Bardi Jawi Rangers based in the West Kimberley, as part of NAILSMA's Dugong and Marine Turtle Project. A 12-month survey of Bardi and Jawi harvest of dugong and marine turtle was completed in January, and the final report submitted in December. Mr Daniel Oades (Kimberley Land Council (KLC) Turtle and Dugong Project Officer) and Mr Mark Shadforth (Bardi Jawi Ranger) visited CAEPR under the Visiting Indigenous Fellowship scheme in August.

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## Philanthropy, non-government organisations and Indigenous development

Though that application was unsuccessful, the partnership between CAEPR and TJSF will continue and this line of research reconfigured in 2009. Preparation has continued for the study of the ways in which non-government organisations work with Indigenous organisations and communities, in collaboration with Professor Larissa Behrendt, University of Technology, Sydney (UTS). Three non-government organisations have agreed to participate in a pilot study to commence in 2009.

The monograph *Contested Governance: Culture, Power and Institutions in Indigenous Australia* was published by ANU EPress. Collaboration with Reconciliation Australia has continued in the development of the electronic Governance Toolkit. Ms Diane Smith continued her involvement as a CAEPR Visiting Fellow.

Extensive consultation has been completed with a range stakeholders including Indigenous organisations, schools and government around effective policy and associated policy issues. A report back to these organisations is expected to be finalised in 2009.

The research is being carried out at sites in remote Western Australia and the Northern Territory and participating organisations include the Ngaanyatjarra Council, Western Australia (WA); Djilpin Arts, Jawoyn region, Northern Territory (NT); Warlpiri Education and Training Trust Advisory Committee, NT; Ngapartji Ngapartji intergenerational language and arts project, NT; and the NT Library remote community Libraries and Knowledge Centres. The aim is to develop resources and models for a sustainable approach to lifespan learning and literacy acquisition, maintenance and transmission in the remote Indigenous context.

A book entitled 'White Man's Poison' is in preparation.

Recent work on the measurement of Aboriginal housing need and a field-based study of Aboriginal camping in a small Northern Territory town demonstrate how difference-based arguments have been losing ground to equality arguments in debates in recent years.

This project will work toward new indices of human poverty and of gender equity. Both indices will be applicable not only to nations, but also to larger populations (world regions or humanity at large) and to smaller groups (such as those targeted or affected by a specific policy or development program).

## COMMUNICATING OUR RESEARCH

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**W**e at CAEPR are convinced of the crucial role for evidence-based research of the highest academic standard in influencing the development of public policy in Indigenous affairs. We are constantly focused on promoting our pure and applied research to where it is needed—to Commonwealth, State and local governments, and to Indigenous communities and organisations as well as other non-government organisations—as a priority.

There are several strands to this endeavour.

### CAEPR staff and visitors publications

In 2008, CAEPR staff and visitors recorded 66 publications, with 37 meeting DEST criteria, as indicated in Appendix C. A further 36 commentaries, unpublished reports and web-based papers are set out in Appendix D.

### Media publications

The year 2008 saw CAEPR staff involved in public debate through television, radio, print and web-based media at an unprecedented level. While it is not feasible to report this effort in detail in relation to interviews and providing information for varied media products, media publications are detailed in Appendix E.

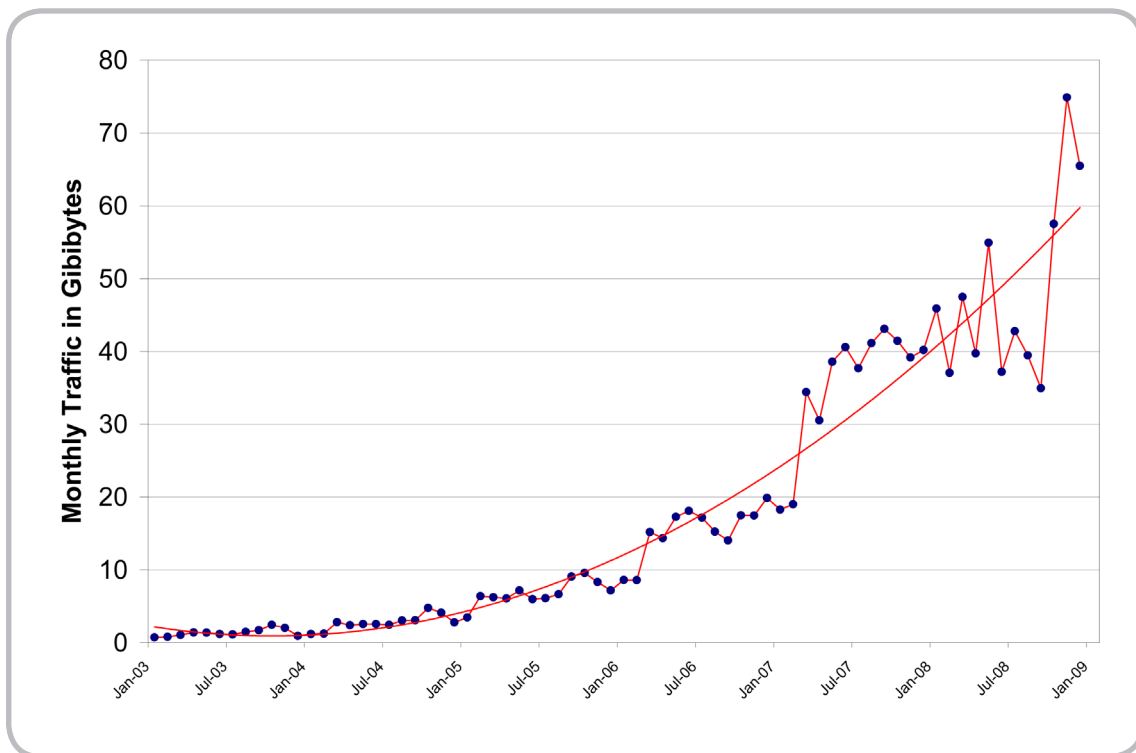
### Submissions to government inquiries

CAEPR maintains strong links with the bureaucracy and public institutions, including collaborations with the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs, the Senate Environment, Communications, Information Technology and Arts Committee and the Senate Standing Committee on Constitutional Affairs. This is reflected in submissions and assistance to inquiries in 2008, set out in Appendix F. Throughout 2008 CAEPR has also been reporting its research findings on Indigenous population analysis to annual meetings of SCATSIA and MCATSIA.

### Public lectures, seminars, workshops, and conferences

CAEPR hosts a seminar program, divided into two series in 2008, with a total of 44 seminars presented. Seminars are held on Wednesdays between 12.30 and 2.00pm in the Humanities Conference Room, First Floor, A.D. Hope Bldg #14 (opposite Chifley Library). Staff gave several public lectures and 188 external conference, seminar and workshop presentations. Details of all presentations are set out in Appendix G.

### The CAEPR publications program

The purpose of the CAEPR publications program is to disseminate research undertaken by CAEPR staff and visitors, as widely and rapidly as possible. This meets the needs of our major stakeholders and fulfils a ‘public good’ outreach role that is a major part of our mission.

The entire CAEPR publications series library from 1991 to 2008 is available for download from the website: this now comprises 29 monographs, 288 discussion papers, 52 working papers and 75 topical issues.

Appendix H provides a full listing of CAEPR publications program outputs for 2008.

### The CAEPR website

The year 2008 was one of steady expansion for the CAEPR website. Our web-based communication strategy continued to deliver the Centre’s research outputs to a wide and increasing audience, with continuing steady growth in document downloads and overall traffic (Fig.1). Total website traffic in 2008 was 577.29 gibibytes (GiB), an increase of 36 per cent over the 2007 total of 424.16 GiB. The CAEPR site recorded over 2,600,000 hits over the 12-month period. A month by month summary of key web traffic indicators for 2008 is presented at Table 1.

Site visitors enjoyed free electronic access to the entire CAEPR publications library (monographs, discussion papers and working papers), as well as to topical issues, reports and project documents. They can also link to media items relating to CAEPR and Indigenous affairs and listen to selected audio podcasts of CAEPR seminars.

Some CAEPR seminars are now made available through the website as streaming audio and MP3 podcasts, together with appropriate handout materials. A seminar is recorded at the discretion of presenters: certain types of presentation, including works in progress and thesis reports, are not appropriate for podcast. For copyright reasons and to encourage robust exchange, the discussion following a presentation is not recorded.

The website now serves as our prime vehicle for the dissemination of research outputs, and PDF versions of CAEPR publications are made available simultaneously with print publication. A total of 742,498 PDF documents were downloaded in 2008, a 10.78 per cent increase on the 2007 total. Table 2 provides a listing of key PDF document downloads.

Several new project sites were launched in 2008, with web pages added for Education Futures, People On Country, and the Indigenous Population Project. The People On Country pages in particular were an ambitious addition to the CAEPR website, serving both the project research team and partner organisations, and incorporating the use of streaming video, interactive maps, and photo galleries.

As an adjunct to our own website, CAEPR enjoys a strong collaboration with ANU E Press. This mode of scholarly publication meshes well with our communication strategy, and recent publications from the CAEPR Research Monograph Series are available at <http://epress.anu.edu.au/> for print sale and for free download in PDF, HTML and mobile device formats. A total of 197,998 publications or chapters were downloaded or viewed in 2008, a 118.97 per cent increase on the 2007 total of 90,423. Table 3 presents a summary of CAEPR Monograph downloads through ANU E press during 2008.

Much progress was made in 2008 in the redesign of a new CAEPR website, to be launched in the first half of 2009. The new site features a database for data consolidation, simplified backup, administration and dynamic content creation, and an integrated Content Management System to facilitate content editing and workflow for the entire CAEPR publications program. A wide range of technical enhancements will improve usability and accessibility for our target audience, including those with visual or other impairments and visitors connecting to the site with mobile devices or with older browsers.

## STUDENTS AND TEACHING

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### DOCTORAL STUDENTS

Several doctoral students were located at CAEPR in 2008.

Katarina Ferro, international doctoral scholar, is writing up research on 'The language of rights among Aboriginal intellectuals in the 21st century', exploring approaches to Indigenous rights by Aboriginal intellectuals Professor Larissa Behrendt and Mr Noel Pearson.

Bill Fogarty continued doctoral research on the topic 'From Pedagogy to production: Land, education and remote Indigenous youth', undertaking further field work in Arnhem Land.

Catherine Slocum, who holds a CASS PhD scholarship, continued doctoral research at CAEPR until September. Catherine transferred to Research School of Humanities at ANU, due to a change in research focus toward art history.

Kate Sullivan began work on doctoral research into Indigenous interaction with the justice system in NSW in March 2008. The work applies an ethnographic approach to an analysis of re-offence and desistance from crime.

Deirdre Tedmanson continued doctoral research on the topic 'Anangu Pitjantjatjara and Australian public policy since the 1980s: What can internal decolonisation mean?', while continuing as a lecturer at the University of South Australia.

Kathryn Thorburn is finalising her dissertation titled 'Whitefella Governance? Managing Selves, Managing Others In and Around Fitzroy Crossing, Western Australia', as an Australian Postgraduate Award (Industry) student under the ICGP.

Nicole Watson commenced part-time doctoral research on land rights and Indigenous property rights, while continuing as a staff member at the Jumbunna Indigenous House of Learning at University of Technology, Sydney.

Simon Pawson commenced Masters of Philosophy research focusing on Indigenous tourism.

## TEACHING AT CAEPR: INDIGENOUS POLICY

CAEPR convened a specialist Indigenous Policy stream of the MAAPD program at the ANU. This course is designed for those with an interest in the application of social scientific methods of critical analysis to policy and development issues in Indigenous affairs. Students also have the option of undertaking an internship at CAEPR. In 2008 Will Sanders coordinated Australian Indigenous Policy (ANTH8040) and Introduction to Australian Indigenous Policy (ANTH8029) in Semester 1. John Taylor coordinated Australian Indigenous Development (ANTH 8045) and Introduction to Australian Indigenous Development (ANTH 8046) in Semester 2. The courses examine the social and economic circumstances of Indigenous Australians across the continent and their relationship to public policy. CAEPR staff contributed a majority of the lectures (see Appendix I).
